Non-Residential Programs

In-Home Family Support Program

Mission

The In-Home Family Support Program is a faith-based ministry that helps keep families safely together by addressing spiritual, academic, emotional, and family needs through a trauma-informed approach using Trust-Based Relational Intervention. Our goal is to strengthen safety, stability, and well-being while supporting families with love and encouragement.

129 families served

356 children served

“This past year, I had the privilege of walking alongside a mom and dad as they navigated the CPS system to regain custody of their three children. After a difficult season marked by shame and judgment, they worked tirelessly for nearly a year to reunite their family.

Through our In-Home Family Support Program, we were able to monitor each 90-day placement and support them every step of the way. I provided parenting education using BrightCourse videos and connected them with donated essentials like clothing and household items. A generous private donor also made Christmas possible for the family.

Most importantly, we were able to encourage them spiritually—sharing a Bible, praying together, and having meaningful conversations about faith. I’m grateful to serve with an agency that supports families both practically and spiritually as they rebuild and reunite.”

The Youth Detention Intervention Program seeks to ensure that every Mississippi detained juvenile is impacted with the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Residential Programs

Mission:

To foster a culture of Christ-like service through purposeful training that strengthens faith, builds skill, and ensures that every individual in our care experiences God's love and belonging.

Three brothers entered our Residential Child Caring Program while being raised by their grandmother. Like many children who come into care, they needed stability, consistency, and love they could trust.

One afternoon, as a houseparent missionary helped the youngest brother put on his shoes, the child quietly said, "I love you." It was a simple moment — but it spoke volumes. It meant he felt safe. He felt seen. He felt loved.

And he was watching.

When he saw positive role models, he followed their example — wearing headphones like they did, learning how to dance with confidence, even learning how to pray. Through everyday moments, he was discovering what healthy love, joy, and faith look like in action.

Today, their grandmother still sends updates. The relationship continues.

Because of the generosity of donors and churches, children and families in our Residential Programs experience more than care — they experience transformation. Your support creates safe spaces, trusted mentors, and Christ-centered homes where children can heal, grow, and learn to say "I love you" — and truly mean it.

Deanash Campus, the former estate of Dizzy Dean and his wife, Patricia Nash Dean, is nestled on 12 beautifully landscaped acres in the Bond Community just north of Wiggins. Children are cared for in a nurturing, home-like setting in Nash Cottage and Moore Cottage. We are grateful to report that by the end of 2025, the campus was fully staffed, with all original 2024 team members continuing to serve, apart from relief houseparents, and all required annual training successfully completed. This year also marked an exciting milestone for two residents who earned their driver's licenses—an important step toward greater independence and confidence for the future.

Farrow Manor Campus, named for Mrs. Ada Farrow, encompasses 187 rural acres in Tate County, just south of Memphis, Tennessee. Throughout 2025, children were encouraged in their faith through nightly devotions, church services, and the faithful witness of houseparents and faithful churches. The campus connected with dozens of churches, pastors, and community leaders during the year and welcomed many groups for tours and visits. At Christmas, generous supporters provided a joyful and abundant celebration for residents, while churches and volunteers served in meaningful ways through financial gifts, facility improvements, and campus projects. 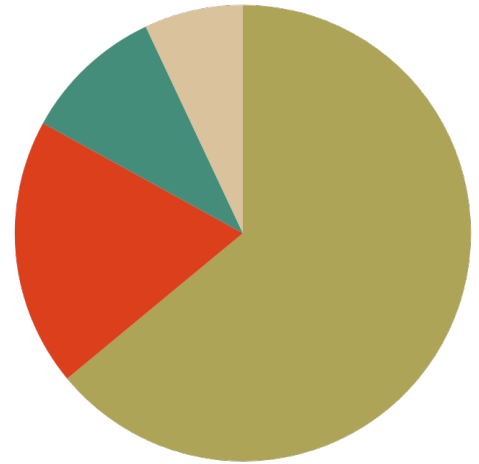

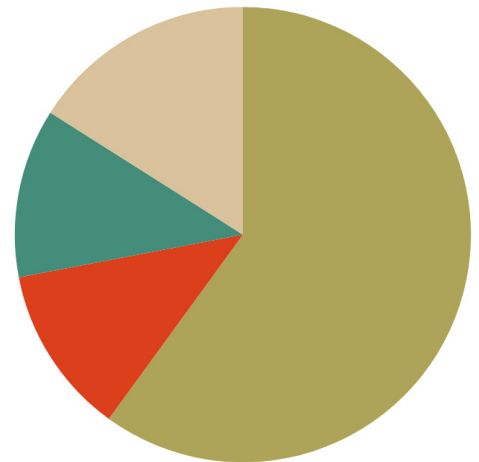
